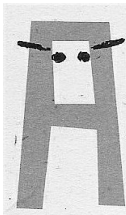

Production Notes

***The Women of Lockerbie*, Deborah Brevoort's moving and poignant award-winning drama about the aftermath of the Pam Am Flight 103 crash, begins and ends on the rolling hills of Scotland. This timely drama is loosely inspired by a true story, although the characters and situations in the play are purely fictional. Written in the structure of a Greek tragedy, it is a poetic drama about the triumph of love over hate.**

The play takes place seven years after the 1988 event in which an American airliner was destroyed by a terrorist bomb over Lockerbie, Scotland. Nearly 300 people were killed. The Livingstons have come to Lockerbie for a memorial service that is being held for the families of the dead. Bill Livingston searches for his wife, Madeline, who wanders looking for the remains of her dead son. It is his hope that Maddie, who has mourned ceaselessly for the past seven years, will finally find closure by visiting the place where their son died; Maddie hopes to discover some remnant of her son, whose body was never recovered from the wreckage. During this process, the Women from Lockerbie offer a mystical brand of grief counseling, telling stories about that awful day when the plane crashed quite literally in their backyards while sharing wise words on how to heal the wounds of the past. As the play unfolds, we realize many have their own wounds that are not yet healed.

Our dear friend and ArtBarn supporter, Judy Maurer, introduced us to this play as we were developing our 2006 *Grassroots* Season. What better way to celebrate the grassroots movement that created ArtBarn than to present this timely portrait of how a grassroots movement of 200 women forced the United States government to release the 11,000 pieces of clothing left by the 103 crash so they could return them to their families? This play shows how ordinary people cope with extraordinary horror. It gives powerful voice to a disturbing contemporary anguish—how to respond to the suffering caused by terrorism while offering new hope to a world witnessing continual acts of revenge and hatred.

This play's powerful message resonates in our post 9/11 world. What is fate? How do you reconcile profound grief with belief in God? How do you cope with evil? It is our sincere hope that ArtBarn's production of *The Women of Lockerbie* helps answer these questions and prompts discussion—and that it stirs us, so that together, we can create our own grassroots movement that demands an end to the revenge, hatred, and suffering of this world as we know it today.
